A Letter From the President

Faith Network was formed as a 501(c)(3) nonprofit for the purpose of building community support for urban public schools, with the intent to “give hope to disadvantaged children.” In September of 2001 we adopted our first school in East Oakland with the support of two congregations. Today we are serving 39 schools with the help of 350 volunteers, 21 congregations and 28 diverse community partners.

The need for hope is still very much evident today:

- Just 76% of California’s high schoolers graduate, putting us 32nd in the nation.
- California teens with limited English proficiency have just a 51% graduation rate.
- Seeds of dropping out are planted in early childhood: vocabulary development at age 3 is a key predictor of school achievement in third grade. Currently, some 60% of Oakland’s 3rd graders read below grade level (in 2001 the figure was 70% so we’re making some progress).
- Urban public schools are over-burdened and under-resourced.
- One third of Oakland public school libraries are shuttered for lack of staffing, affecting some 10,000 students.
- California ranks 47th in science scores across the nation.
- Nearly 70% of students in Alameda County now qualify for free or reduced-priced meals at school; many children come back to school on Monday hungry and not ready to learn.
- The unlevelled playing field has created barriers to education and a fulfilling future for thousands of East Bay children.



As you read Faith Network’s 2011-12 Annual Report, you will catch a glimpse of how we are responding to these needs through Project Urban School Adoption (PUSA) and our three targeted intervention programs: Succeeding by Reading, Science Horizons and Health4Kids.

Faith Network pictures a city where every child feels loved and safe, where every child has reliable adults who model positive values and where every child can develop as a whole person. On behalf of our Board of Directors and Staff, we offer our deep gratitude for our dedicated and generous volunteers, partners, donors and the inspiring young people who are the reason for our existence.

Faith Network at a Glance 2011-12

OVERVIEW

Faith Network, a 501(c) (3) non-profit public benefit corporation, was founded in 2001 to help build up healthy children and families by *rallying community support for urban public schools*. Our services are non-sectarian and are open to the community at large. **Our mission** is to give hope to vulnerable children by showing them unconditional love, surrounding them with caring adults, helping them develop academic and life skills so crucial to their growth and fulfillment, and working together to meet the diverse needs of students in our East Bay public schools.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Faith Network operated 18 Excel Reading Clinics with **139** trained tutors serving **233 children**. We delivered **over 34,400 food bags** to low-income children in 23 schools. We helped **233** students from 5 schools attend Outdoor Education Science Camp. Faith Network channeled a variety of resources to students and schools.

COMMUNITY PARTNERS

We collaborated with **49** congregations and community partners and are continuously cultivating new relationships to better serve our schools.

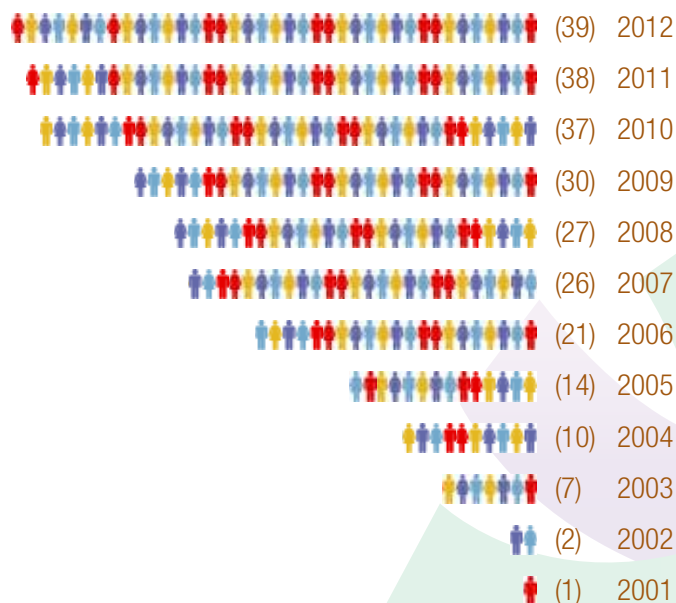
SERVICE AREA

Faith Network served **39** schools, primarily in Alameda County with a concentration in Oakland.

VOLUNTEERS

Over **350** volunteers provided support to our public schools as mentors, tutors, chaperones, teacher appreciation coordinators, classroom assistants, library helpers, food baggers, writing coaches, playground monitors and campus beautification helpers.

STAFF

Faith Network's staff consisted of **3** full time and **4** part-time employees, **2** interns and **1** volunteer staff member.

POPULATION SERVED

We served directly and indirectly over 5,000 students, ages 5 to 18, who are attending under-resourced urban schools. Most of these students come from low-income families, 71% of whom qualify for free/reduced priced meals. Demographically, these students are: 30.5% African American, 40.5% Latino, 16% Asian/Pacific Islander, 9% Caucasian, and 4% Other. Almost a third of these students are learning English as a second language.

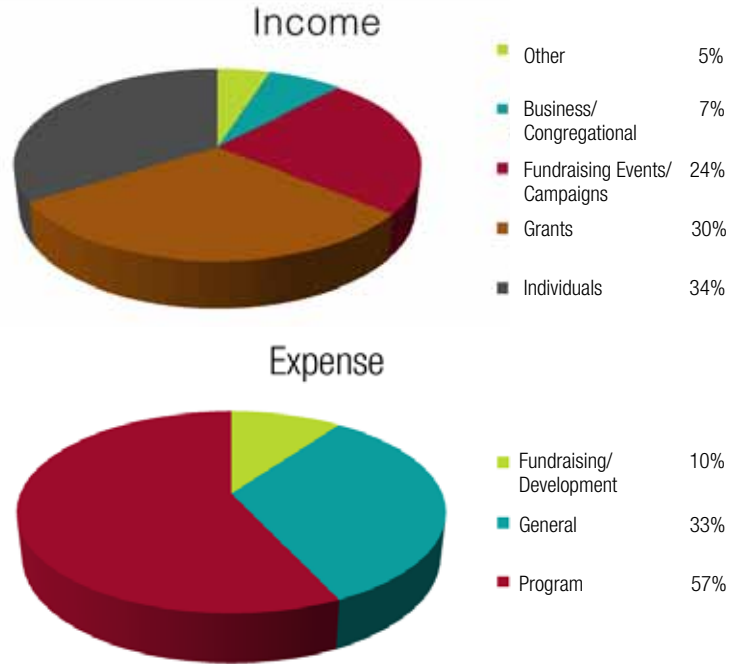

Finances



Challenges

Literacy

A high percentage of economically disadvantaged children in the Oakland Unified School District (OUSD) are falling behind academically: 50% of 3rd graders are not proficient in reading. These statistics are particularly grim as studies have shown that 3rd graders who lag behind in reading have, at best, a 20% chance of ever catching up. A student who is not a “modestly skilled reader” will probably not graduate from high school.

Science

California ranks 47th in science in the U.S. Fifth graders in OUSD score 354 on average in CST Science, compared to a mean of 367 for their state counterparts. At inner-city schools, the gap is even more pronounced: Over 70% of 5th graders in Oakland urban schools score poorly in science.

Health

Although children need adequate nutrition and good health to perform well, many students have poor health conditions: 42% of children are overweight in OUSD, 1 out of 5 have asthma, and 70% have tooth decay. Some of the 71% of children in OUSD who depend on school-supplied lunches are undernourished on weekends, and 43% of emergency food recipients from the local food bank are children under the age of 18.

Programs



At the start of FYE 6/09, Faith Network responded to the urgent needs of our underserved public schools by launching the **Succeeding by Reading** initiative. Now completing its fourth year, this three-tiered program

fosters partnerships between urban public schools and the wider community in order to advance student achievement in the area most critical for academic success: literacy.

Excel Reading Clinics

Excel Reading Clinics provide individualized instruction and reading support for primary grade students who have fallen behind with their reading skills. Excel offers no-fee weekly tutoring sessions during school hours, working with students referred by school personnel. In the 2011-2012 school year, we staffed 18 Excel Reading Clinics with 139 trained tutors to serve 233 students.

All reading clinic participants were tested at the start of the program to assess their understanding of phonics and their reading ability. The 174 students who participated in the program for a half-year or more were tested at the end of the school year to measure their progress. Of those post-tested, 71% made two or more grade levels of gain, and 23% made one or one-and-a-half grade levels of gain. The remaining 6% advanced less than one grade level. We are in regular conversation with teachers and principals regarding additional resources for clinic students who do not make at least one year of progress in reading.



We held closing celebrations for our clinic students in the last two weeks of the school year. Students received certificates and praise from their tutors for their hard work and accomplishments. They selected books to take home and read over the summer and enjoyed refreshments. Both Faith Network staff and school staff were on hand to support and congratulate the students during these events.

Library Support

Volunteers provided ongoing library assistance at 3 of our Excel Reading Clinic schools and special project assistance at 2 schools. About 15 Faith Network library volunteers served approximately 1000+ hours during this school year in 4 ongoing and 2 special-project capacities. Faith Network placed volunteer librarians at 3 schools. One third of Oakland public school libraries are shuttered for lack of staff, affecting some 10,000 students.



At Emerson, our library volunteers staffed the school library each afternoon to keep the library open and available to the school's 275 students.

At Maxwell Park, the Faith Network volunteer who had resuscitated the library the previous year continued her service, providing library visit times for all grades and organizing Reading is Fundamental book give-aways. She coached new library volunteers at Lakeview to help them prepare their library for opening, filled in at Emerson's library when the regular volunteers were unavailable, assisted OUSD District Librarian in a variety of capacities, and participated in conversations with the Friends of Oakland Public School Libraries.

At Lakeview, a professional children's librarian and a retired television news anchor volunteered their time to resuscitate that library, providing library visit times for all grade levels and Reading is Fundamental book give-aways.



Science Horizons gives 4th and 5th graders a unique hands-on learning experience of the natural sciences, inspires them to raise their scholastic performance and promotes good stewardship of the environment.

This program supports the teaching and learning of 4th and 5th grade science with standards-based hands-on activities and field trips at 8 schools.

Teacher and Classroom Support

Though Oakland has a state of the art, kit-based system for providing materials, supplies, and professional development, many teachers find it difficult to find enough time for lesson preparation, maintenance and care of live specimen, and inventory of kits. Some new teachers also struggle with the classroom management that is required for exciting hands-on science activities. Science Horizons provided 30 hours of professional development as well as science volunteers and an experienced teacher coach to assist and facilitate in the classroom.

660 4th and 5th graders at 9 schools received classroom science instruction during and after school. Students were taught behavior standards and science definitions. Students participated in hands-on activities related to the food chain and observed, touched, and held live arthropods. They learned about energy transfer through the food chain which they related to the live arthropods.

Science Camp and Field Trips

A major feature of the Science Horizons program is the focus on environmental education. This includes 1) a 3-day experience for 5th grade students to the Mission Springs Outdoor Education Camp in the Santa Cruz mountains 2) 1-day field trips to local parks and informal science centers for grades K-5 and 3) exposure to live plants and animals in the classrooms and school gardens.



Since the program began, over 1,700 students have attended the 3-day camp. Science Horizons staff helped with the completion of legal documentation required for overnight trips and assisted with recruiting and processing chaperones (including covering the cost for live scan fingerprint clearance), as well as professional development for naturalist, arranging for transportation, and helping plan fundraisers.

233 5th grade students from 5 schools participated in the 3-day Mission Springs Outdoor Education Science camp, and Science Horizons coordinated and assisted with 20 1-day field trips for 360 students to Audubon Canyon Ranch and Lawrence Berkeley Labs.

Family Science Night

A rare treat in the Science Horizons Program this spring was the first ever Family Science Night (FSN), orchestrated by a Sandia National Laboratories' outreach team, who brought hands-on science activities to elementary school students and their families at PLACE@Prescott Elementary School. Stations were set up around the Prescott auditorium, each with an "experiment" for students to try. Each activity employed everyday household materials like coffee filters, baking soda, straws, balloons and glue to explore basic scientific concepts like aerodynamics, magnetism, and chemical reactions. Four local elementary schools in West Oakland participated in the event which, according to Principal Enomwoyi Booker, was a huge success, drawing a larger turnout of parents and children than any similar school event in memory.

Volunteers

Science Horizons volunteers assisted teachers in the classroom and worked in the after school science programs. They also volunteered as chaperones for classes going to camp or going on field trips. They helped with the design and development of gardens that will become science learning centers. Most of our current volunteers have experience in either scientific fields or have worked at informal science centers. They will also be mentors for the Career Pipeline program being developed for students who graduate from 5th grade and who are interested in Science Technology Engineering Math (STEM) careers. An average of 14 volunteers contributed 184 hours for afterschool tutoring and teacher assistance.

Health4Kids



During the 2011-12 school year, **Health4Kids** helped make it possible for over 2,200 low-income students to receive adequate nutrition on the weekend. Health4Kids continued its partnership with the Alameda County Community Food Bank to distribute bags of nutritious food to elementary schools. We packed 2,200 bags of food, twice monthly, for distribution to 23

elementary schools, 14 in Oakland, 2 in Berkeley, 4 in Hayward and 1 in Livermore. In total, 34,415 bags of food were packed by an average of 20 volunteers.



Faith Network also continued its partnership with the Kaiser Permanente Educational Theatre Program to bring performances, workshops and family presentations/dinners to several of our schools. The 50-minute theatrical performances featuring puppets, music, dance, comedy and audience participation, are geared toward teaching the children the joy of reading, learning about nutrition, exercise, safety gear, conflict resolution and violence prevention, and the dangers of smoking.



Project Urban School Adoption



Project Urban School Adoption (PUSA) addresses school needs outside of our three core programs and channels a variety of resources to our urban public schools.

Faith Network facilitated various group volunteer opportunities such as First Covenant Church at Laurel Elementary, Mission Year Interns at OUSD's SMART Center, Safeway employees at the Food Bank, Convergence at MLK Jr. Elementary school library.

In-kind donations such as a book drives sponsored by Safeway Women's Network Group and Girl Scouts, classroom supplies from Convergence Church and First Presbyterian Church, Berkeley providing personal care items for families of East Oakland Pride.



Faith Network provided an opportunity for over 50 students to attend summer camp through Mission Springs Frontier Ranch and Today's Youth Matter.

Faith Network hosted several luncheons and parties for teachers and staff of the schools we serve to show our appreciation.

Thanks to a generous donor, we were able to provide bicycles for Emerson's "Bikes for Best Attendance" program.

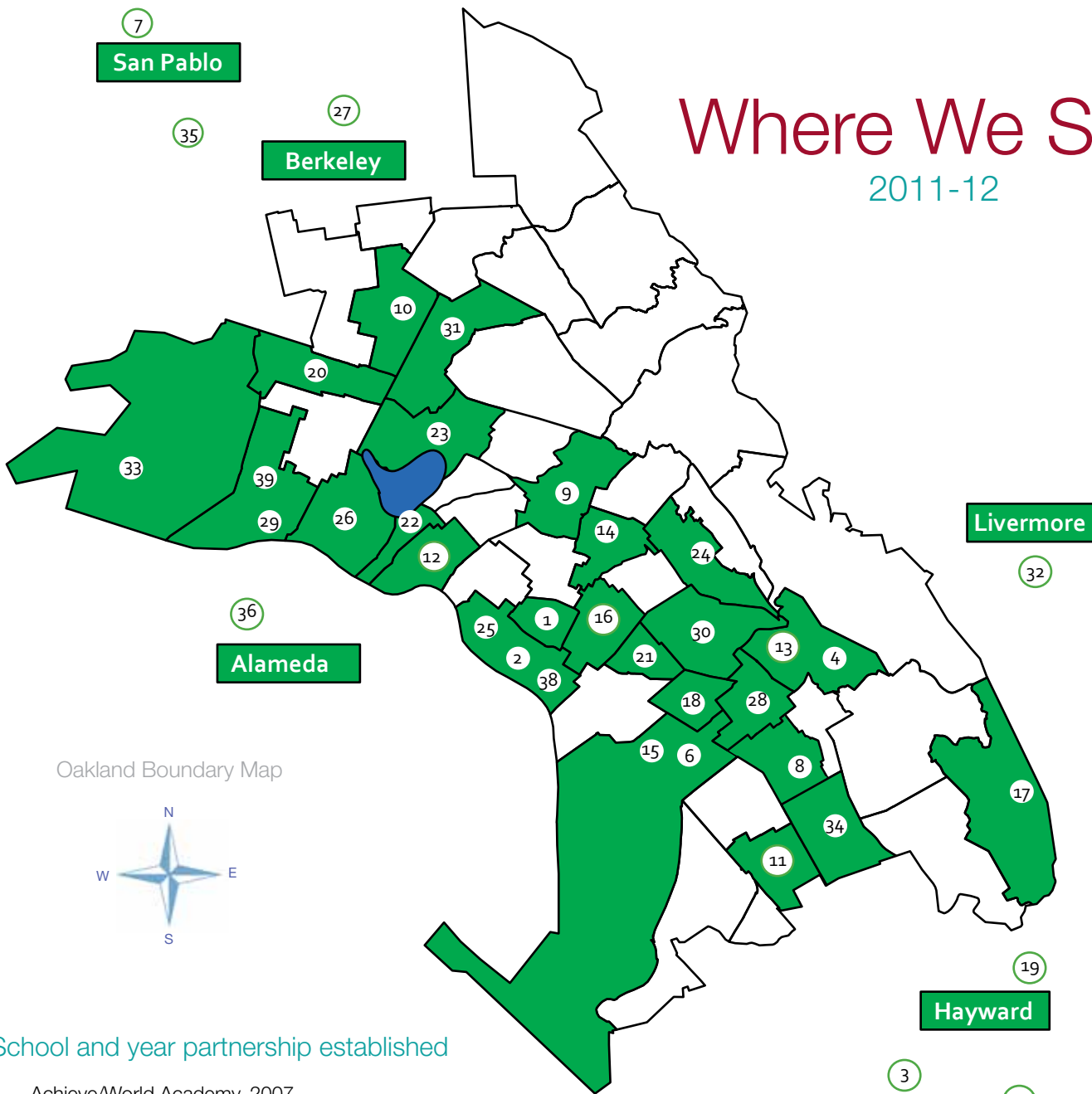
Faith Network partnered with California Dictionary Project to distribute dictionaries to every third grader at 15 elementary schools in Oakland.
